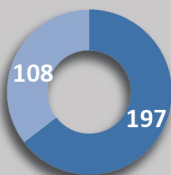
Camp Coordination and Camp Management (CCCM) is about improving the lives of displaced persons to help them live with dignity, even during displacement. As such the International Organization for Migration (IOM) Myanmar has been working towards elevating the CCCM capacity available in country since 2015 through various capacity building initiatives, as currently there are large numbers of displaced persons in country due to natural and man-made disasters. In Kachin and Northern Shan States over 98,000 people are still displaced as a result of the conflict that erupted in June 2011. In Rakhine State it is estimated that over 120,000 remain Internally Displaced and over 70,000 have fled to Bangladesh (UN estimates).

IOM has been training and coaching CCCM practitioners, service providers and Government officials using CCCM Global Cluster materials for the past three years in collaboration with the CCCM National Cluster and the support of OFDA and ECHO. Training topic included: introduction to CCCM, roles and responsibilities, the camp life cycle, participation, coordination, mainstreaming protection, child protection, SGBV, care and maintenance and camp closure and durable solutions.

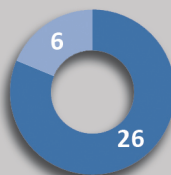

CCCM Activity By Type Per Year



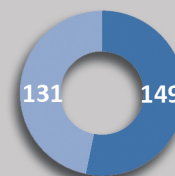
